It is my privilege and pleasure to welcome you all to Ascot Drive today on this our first Open Day since Derby City Transport Ltd. was formed on the 26th October last year.

On that day the first part of the Transport Act 1985 was enacted. As a result local bus services were deregulated and local authority bus undertakings, such as we were then, became arms length companies divorced from their controlling councils. The companies have to be run commercially in keeping with companies act legislation.

This afternoon we have the opportunity to show you some aspects of the many activities the company now undertake. We provide many local bus services in and around Derby; we also have a fleet of luxury coaches which undertake excursions and tours throughout the U.K. Private Hire work extends into the European continent.

Our engineering facilities are open for your scrutiny. These provide the maintenance back-up not only for the buses and coaches but also for the 200 ancillary vehicles - lorries and vans - which the company owns and contract hires out to local authorities including Derby City Council.

Added to this we have an active M.O.T. testing unit available to the general public, which also doubles as a testing station for supporting the private hire and hackney carriage vehicles seen around the city.

Many side shows and activity areas have been provided to make your visit an enjoyable one, we look forward to your participation.

However, the Open Day would not be a success without the full support of the trade, the enthusiasts and above all, you, the members of the public.

Derby City Transport Ltd., was formed on 26th October 1986 under the Transport Act 1985. It is a private company and is owned by Derby City Council which appoints the Board of Directors. - * Counts 8 tonnes of coins a week.

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

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


Brief History of Public Transport in Derby

- 1840 First Horse-Omnibus in Derby operated between King Street and the Station.
- 1879 Derby Tramways Company Limited formed.
- 1880 First horse tramcar operated March 6th.
- 1881 First Sunday Service, 29th May.
- 1881 Royal Agricultural Show, Derby, July 14 18th.
- 1885 First horse bus operated, June.
- 1889 Corporation took over undertaking from Derby Tramways Co., November 1st.
- 1901 Derby Corporation Act authorised the construction of electric street tramways.
- 1903 Decision taken to electrify horse tramcar routes.
- 1903 Construction of electric tramways began.
- 1904 Victoria Street premises occupied.
 Osmaston Road (Abingdon Street) works occupied, July.
 First Electric tramcar operated, July 27th.
- 1906 Royal Agricultural Show, Derby, June 27th and 30th.
- 1907 Last horse tramcar run November 28th.



Trolley bus 162 — Delivered 1938. Daimler CTM4 Chassis, Brush H28/26R Body. One of a batch of 6 and one of the very few Daimler trolley buses.



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- 1908 Friar Gate depot closed 21st January, tenancy at stables terminated March 25th.
- 1909 Nottingham Road shed opened February 1st.
- 1914 First World War commenced, August 4th.
- 1917 Last horse bus ran, May 18th. First electric bus operated, May 19th. Morledge bus depot and stables closed.
- 1918 First World War terminated, November 11th.
- 1919 Coal crises, July 25th August 16th.
- 1921 Royal Agricultural Show, Derby, June 28th July 22nd.
- 1924 Last electric bus ran June 30th. First motor bus operated, July 1st.
- 1926 Nottingham Road Shed extended.
- 1927 1st April, all vehicles from this date had pneumatic tyres.
- 1928 First double-deck motor buses.
 Osmaston Road tramcar shed and omnibus garage opened.
- 1930 It was decided to replace the trams with trolley buses.
 14th November, First tram route abandoned Nottingham
 Road.



Bus number 72 — Delivered 1939. Daimler COG5 Chassis, Brush H28/26R Body. One of the third batch of Double-deckers bought before the war, of the standard type of pre-war Double-deckers.








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
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First trolley vehicle operated, January 9th. Centre of Derby flooded, May 22nd.

Royal Agricultural Show, Derby, July 4th - 8th. Central bus station opened, October 2nd.

1934 Last electric tramcar ran, July 2nd.

January, First diesel-engined bus. 1935 H. M. King George V Jubilee Week - record receipts -May 5th - 11th.

Motor bus fleet used for evacuation of Derby school children September 2nd.

Great Britain declared war on Germany, 11.00 am., September 3rd.

Curtailment of motor bus services due to war emergency, September 17th.

Curtailment of trolley bus services due to war emergency, October 1st.

Service dis-organised by exceptionally heavy snowfall, service suspended at 7.30 pm., January 31st. Trolley and Motor bus services curtailed, last bus 9.30 pm. approximately, September.

Trolley bus services withdrawn Sunday mornings, November.



Bus Number 156 — Delivered 1964. Daimler CVG6 Chassis Roe H37/28R. Now preserved is an example of Derby Double-deckers purchased between 1961-1966.

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Trolley & Motor bus services continued until 10.00 pm., each evening, March 4th. V.E. Day, all services ceased at 5 pm., May 8th. V.J. Day, all services suspended (specials excepted) August 15th. Restoration of Sunday morning services from approximately 10.00 am., December 30th. Extension of evening services, last bus approximately 10.30 pm., May 5th. October 31st, last petrol-engined bus ran. London Road depot acquired December 18th. Abingdon Street Depot closed. 1948 Extension of evening services, last bus approximately 11.00 pm., February 6th. Major fleet replacements commenced. Sunbeam 2 axle trolley buses and Daimler CVD6 motor buses. October 6th, Ascot Drive depot opened. Last trolley route extension (to Morden Green).



Bus number 172 — Delivered 1966 Daimler Fleetline Chassis, Roe H44/34F Body. First of a large number of 148 fleetline's purchased becoming the Derby standard Double-deckers from 1966-1981.

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Bus number 101 — Delivered 1978 Foden Chassis. Northern Counties H43/30F Body.
One of only 7 made withdrawn from service 1976.
Purchased for evaluation purposes.



Bus number 102 — Delivered 1980 Metrobus DR102/4. Purchased for evaluation, and painted in non standard livery from new.

1960 Last trolley bus delivered.

January, first major trolley bus route abandonment route 30 Victoria Street to Browning Circle, (Chaddesden,
Pole Road works only from 1950).

1966 Last rear-loading bus delivered.

September 10th, last trolley bus ran.
 Osmaston Road depot closed.
 Change of livery to Blue/Grey - initially for on man operation.

1973 Tailby & George of Willington (Blue Bus Services) taken over.

1974 Local Government changes - loss of County Borough status.

1976 January 5th, Willington depot destroyed by fire.

1977 Derby became a City.

1980 August 15th, last operation of a rear platform bus.

1986 Closure of Guildhall Offices and transfer of activities to former Tramway Offices in Victoria Street.

1986 October 26th, Derby City Transport Limited formed under Transport Act 1985.
